


cean Drive sat down with Miami Beach resident John Turchin-the mastermind behind the private North Carolina community The Lodges at Eagles Nest-to hear his vision for an allencompassing camping community and to find out why so many Gold Coasters enjoy the contrast of life at a higher altitude.



Tell us about Eagles Nest.

It's a gated community and resort in the town of Banner Elk, which sits in the heart of the Blue Ridge Mountains. There are currently 17 homes built, of which 15 have been sold. Eagles Nest is a lifestyle


place-you can live there year-round, or treat it as your second home. It's refreshing to Miamians because it's the total opposite of South Beach. We have more than 1,500 acres of land, 100 of which we're using to grow an organic farm and vineyard. It's a place to be forever young.

Why is North Carolina a great destination for South Floridians?

It's a very easy place to get to. After a flight to Charlotte, it's less than a two-hour drive to Banner Elk. There are also private airstrips close to town. If you want to drive, it'll take 12 hours from Miami and 10 from New York. North Carolina is perfect for people on the East Coast who don't want to go out West anymore. The mountains are majestic and beautiful and the topography is lush. The average temperature is 68 degrees in

What are some of the amenities that come with owning a home at Eagles Nest?

We have everything-a giant sports field, amphitheater, library, spa, equestrian center, shooting range, motocross track, barbecue pavilion, beach-volleyball court, tennis, hiking and biking trails and an art studio. There's a fivestar teepee village where you can sleep under the stars, and we're building a small recording studio. We have everything except a golf course. But Wayne Huizenga built a course next door called Diamond Creek, so if anyone needs to play golf, we send them over there.



We have houses from \$500,000 to \$5 million. Larry Pearson—one of the best architects in the country-designed several homes with me, as did Miami-based Cesar Molina. They're all magnificent, small homes that suit the clientele of today's market. We're not compromising anything.

Which boldfaced Miami names have homes in the area?

Wayne Huizenga, former Dolphin and current sportscaster Bob Griese and Michele Pommier, to name a few. These people have been coming to North Carolina forever. OD
